EISD refuels surplus

While the EISD has raised its tax rate to help pay its debt, it's making headway in recouping cash from ongoing litigation that had pulled on its fund reserves.

The district reached a \$1.2 million settlement with one of the groups that worked on plumbing

issues at two EISD structures.

The Board of Trustees approved the compromise settlement agreement in July between EISD and SHW Group, Estes, McClure & Associates, Inc. and Glenn Engineering.

Those funds will go toward replenishing the district's fund balance, which was tapped to pay for necessary repairs after the plumbing work was found to be faulty.

The settlement funds could technically be used to help the district with any number of specific expenses, but Superintendent Barbara Qualls said it should not be looked at as extra money or disposable funds.
